About us

The Furniture Project was started by Omaha firefighter, Drew Gerken, in 2013. Going into homes as a firefighter, Drew saw first hand the impoverishment many families in Omaha were experiencing. Children with no beds, families with no tables or chairs, people living in desperate conditions. Drew began delivering donated furniture as a volunteer, and has carried the organization to its current non profit status.

Current Situation

There is no centralized furniture warehouse in Omaha. Agencies rely on duplicated small donation centers scattered around the city. Caseworkers struggle to obtain donated furniture, and often have issues finding storage and transportation.

Problem Solved


A centralized "one stop shop" warehouse will provide a solution for Omaha. Agencies can focus on providing quality services, instead of worrying where they will obtain household items for clients. Duplication of furniture collection and storage can end.




Vision for Omaha

Donated furniture delivered to families in need






Modeled after 'Bridging' in Minneapolis

- Bridging (501(c)3 non profit) is a centralized furniture warehouse that collects donated household items and then distributes requested items through social service agencies throughout the Twin Cities Metro area
- 48,000 square foot warehouse
- Serves 4,000 households a year (100,000 households since 1987)
- Families can visit the warehouse to "shop" for items. All items are then delivered to the family's home or are made ready for pickup.
- Agencies can request furniture for clients, shopping on their behalf, if appropriate (Appointments are \$60 and delivery is \$180 for a truckload of furniture).







How Do We Get There?



- Need 15,000 to 30,000 square foot warehouse
- Hire Executive Director for The Furniture Project
- Hire 1 full time warehouse staff member
- Hire 2 part time delivery drivers
- Hire volunteer coordinator
- Purchase one additional delivery truck (currently own one truck)
- Consolidate other smaller donation centers around Omaha (through partnership and then by merging)
- Advertise The Furniture Project as Omaha's "one stop" for donating furniture and household items
- Create citywide referral process
- Visit 'Bridging' in Minneapolis to see their model and learn how to replicate in Omaha





The Furniture Project has already been an invaluable resource to Lutheran Family Services, the largest refugee resettlement agency in Omaha, Nebraska. By complementing our capacity and stepping into the gaps--providing furniture, home supplies, and transportation, all in a timely fashion--the Furniture Project has been a force multiplier in our ability to set up new homes for incoming refugees looking to start a new life in our community.

As LFS prepares for this new wave of Afgans fleeing persecution and terrorism--perhaps the largest US refugee resettlement effort in our history--we see this as an opportunity to think anew and creatively and as part of this, would be very interested in exploring improvements in our community's resettlement 'infrastructure.' For example, an even more capable Furniture Project, able to serve as the regular, ongoing furniture hub for the Omaha community and as a partner with LFS may offer significant, real advantages and increase efficiencies for multiple interested parties-for social service orgaizations such as LFS, for the Furniture Project, for the funding community, and most importantly, for the people we serve.





When refugees arrive in Omaha, they come with only the clothes on their backs and a small suitcase. As a refugee resettlement agency, one of our first tasks is to make sure that our newly arriving families have a clean, safe and furnished apartment.

The Furniture Project is one of Refugee Empowerment Center's most important partners. They help supply furniture (and just as importantly, they help us move the furniture too!). Without the Furniture Project, families would have to pay for the furniture themselves out of the very meager \$1,200 stipend they receive. There are lots of generous people in Omaha willing to donate furniture, but without a great organization to manage, store, and distribute those donations, we lose out on this generosity.

With an estimated 5 times more refugee families arriving this year than in years past, the more storage space we have for furniture, the better!
