



Going Upstream

CLEANING EDUCATION PROGRAM



It all started with bleach. We were assisting a gentleman who came to America as a resettled refugee from Burma. He asked us to help him get his landlord to fix some broken items in his apartment. Before we left, he motioned us to his kitchen. Pulling out a bottle of bleach, he pointed to the stove, which was covered in stuck on grease. "Do you know what I can use to get the grease off?" he asked via the interpreter.

"Every week I go to the store and pick a new cleaning product to try to get the grease off. This week, I bought this bottle." He demonstrated how he tried pouring bleach on his stove, but it wasn't working. "No one taught me what to use when I came to America. Do you know what I can use?" Out of that moment sparked the idea of a fully fledged Cleaning **Education Program. A program** that would provide hands-on teaching for people who were resettled as refugees in our citu.



OUR MODEL



One-on-one classes, taught by former refugees, in the native language of the family



Two and four week follow-ups for reteaching



Each family is given a cleaning starter kit -- chemicals are labeled with reusable, translated, water proof tags



WHY WE DO THIS

When refugees are resettled to the USA, the federal government only allows for **90 days of support**. After that, families have to be 100% self-sufficient. This means finding a job, enrolling kids in school, and being able to pay all bills and rent with no support. Those first 90 days go by in a blur, and there is usually **not enough time** (or resources) to acclimate a family to using American cleaning supplies and taking care of their new living arrangement. Our staff (80% are former refugees) have described the **shock of coming to America**:

- Many families come from refugee camps that have no running water, electricity, plumbing or appliances
- In the camps, many families have limited or no access to soap and most have no experience using cleaning chemicals
- Moving to America is a culture shock, to put it lightly.
 Families move into apartments and houses that have appliances most have never used before: thermostats, refrigerators, microwaves, dishwashers, stoves, furnaces, air conditioning, sinks and toilets
- If no one teaches families how to clean and maintain their home, many end up randomly guessing cleaning supplies at the store (or use water and a rag for all cleaning)
- The vast majority of resettled families do not speak or read English, which presents a tremendous barrier in many ways, including choosing items to purchase at the store

Restoring Dignity believes that **every family deserves a clean and healthy home**. For resettled refugees, this means providing quality, hands-on education, to properly acclimate families to their new homes. Our Cleaning Education Program removes barriers, restores dignity within homes, and **provides culturally appropriate support and education** in a respectful manner.

COVID-19

Due to Covid-19, we have temporarily changed our teaching method from **in-home to online**. Our cleaning educators deliver cleaning starter kits to family homes, and then **meet them online**, via FaceTime, Zoom or Facebook Messenger Video Chat. From mid-March to mid-July, we were unable to teach classes, due to focusing our attention on Covid-19 relief. However, we have since started classes again, and are back to full teaching capacity.





CLIENT PERCEPTION








BATHROOM CLEANING




OVERALL SCORE

Before the first cleaning class and the two and four week follow-up classes, clients were asked to show the cleaning educator how they cleaned a variety of surfaces and rooms in their home. The cleaning educator then graded the client based on the skills they showed.

Percentage of families who successfully demonstrated how to properly clean their stove, refrigerator/freezer, table/countertops, floor, and dishes/pots/pans.




On average, families who graduated from our program improved their knowledge and cleaning skills in the kitchen from 20% to 97%






